The higher they are, the less afraid




with his friend, he plays leapfrog. When they argue, Mano Dino stays alone in his garden.

He discovers that his sadness can be much greater than his garden.



Mano Dino is so small that one day the wind blows him away from his home.

He is lost in the middle of the ocean.



Mano Dino is a puppet show for toddlers in which the characters are hands.

By adding eyes to the hands, or sometimes without any artifice, the hands become tender



To make the poetic universe of our character even more accessible to this very young audience, the puppeteer uses props children see in their daily life.

It then becomes very easy to project into the life of our new friend.

The whole story takes place in a garden, or almost.

You didn't know it, but your garden is populated by dinosaurs!

Sitting on cushions, the spectators are close to the stage that measures 80 cm high and 1.15 meter long.

The show is with no words. It is accompanied by a soundtrack inspired by Frédéric Chopin's piqno compositions, sometimes associated with sound effects such as the rain or the wind... Our show has been conceived using the Black Theater technique. A "cyrtain of light" sets the frame of the stage. The manipulator, dressed in black velveteen disappears behind the cyrtain of light. This technique does not exclude the presence of the puppeteer.

Not long ago, some friends came over to our house and gave our 2-year-old daughter a book by Ramona Badescu illystrated by Benjamin Chayd entitled Pomelo Begins to Grow. In the evening, we started reading the story of Pomelo, a tiny pink elephant with a huge trunk born under a dandelion.

Jill, our daughter, was delighted. So were we. The story of this little elephant who takes the time to gaze at life around him,

met our desire for a puppet show for the young audience in which we also take the time to create and give life to shapes in a great simplicity in order to enrich the child with emotions that only time and imagination can provide. we guickly decided to try a theatrical adaptation. To embody Pomelo we first thought of a puppet. Then the hand imposed itself on us.

Its possibilities of expression seemed to us endless. But as the work progressed, the elephant gave way to another animal.

A dinosqur. At first, we were not sure of the nature of the animal, and then it became clear.

The trynk fell off.





Pomelo left us.

A piece of his garden remained.

His words disappeared.

Mysic took their place.

The animal hand began to write...

Simple and spontaneous moves.

It became touching.

we forgot about the body to which it was attached. The animal hand became free. Its name came to us:

Mano Dino. Along with it, came the desire to talk about encounters and journeys, in the simplest way, withou illustrations, as if there was something obvious in this animated

hand, something essential.

This was the beginning of this great adventure that started with Pomelo and kept on with Mano Dino, an adventure in which we wanted to create a sober, pictorial and poetic Ignguage for the toddlers.
